Electric Power Outages

Recently, Sunset Hill neighbors have reported a number of electricity power outages that seem to be happening with increasing frequency. Your president contacted Westar and had a long discussion with their representative about the best way to reduce the number of outages. Here's what I learned.

- The best way to minimize outages is to report them to Westar every time they happen. Even if the interruption in service is only momentary, call the Westar hotline at 1-800-544-4857 and report the outage. If you come home and all of your clocks are blinking 12:00, call the outage hotline and report an outage. You can also report an outage online by following this link. This allows Westar to pinpoint the exact area where the problem exists. As the number of outage reports from an area increase, a work order will be generated and a technician will come to inspect the lines.
- Power outages that are short in duration are almost always generated by local issues; a squirrel nest on a transformer, a loose transformer lead, a failing switch, a faulty house drop cable. These local disruptions can only be found if local residents report outages.
- The new meters that Westar has been installing on our homes will automatically report an outage if it lasts more than 15 minutes. Nonetheless, **call the hotline if an outage occurs**.
- You can call the outage hotline to find out the history of outages at your home. Just give them your address or account phone number and they will tell you the date and cause of outages for the last two years or so.
- You can view a map of ongoing outages with an estimate of restoration time here.
- Finally, you can download the MyWestar app for your smart phone. When severe weather knocks your power out, the MyWestar app is the fastest way to report an outage and see an outage map with real-time information about when your power will be restored even if your computer, phone and Wi-Fi are down. Download the app from the AppStore or Google Play.

Short Term Rental Ordinance Passed, Then Modified

When the Lawrence City Commission voted Sept. 19 to require permits and licenses for short-term rentals, some commissioners said that they were unsure about a \$1 million insurance requirement and would like to discuss it further. At its meeting Tuesday, Oct. 2, the commission voted 4-1, with Commissioner Leslie Soden against, to strike that requirement from the regulations.

Under the newly created regulations, licenses for short-term rentals require yearly inspections, proof of taxes paid, and adherence to the city's parking and occupancy rules. As originally proposed, the regulations also required short-term rental operators to have a certificate of insurance in an amount of at least \$1 million for casualty, personal injury and property damage. Commissioner Herbert noted that Airbnb, which is one of the most popular Great Plains Media

KU Agrees to Discuss Bob Billings Location for Transit Hub

The University of Kansas has agreed to enter into negotiations with the City of Lawrence to locate a Transit Hub on KU property on the south side of Bob Billings Parkway between Iowa and Crestline. The city has been trying for years to find a suitable



central location for the hub as an alternative to the current location across from the Public Library on Vermont St. A more central location will allow Lawrence Transit to modify routes to better serve the citizens of Lawrence, and should reduce travel time for bus riders.

Lawrence Transit has stated many times in the past that a more central location will not mean that downtown routes will go away. Downtown Lawrence will continue to be a major destination and will be well-served by bus routes when the new hub opens. Good news for all of us who rely on the bus to get around quickly and cheaply.

In a related note, Lawrence Transit would like to share information with Sunset Hill residents about the K-12 Student Fall Bus Pass. For only \$10, students can access unlimited transit rides from January through April. <u>Please check out their Facebook page</u> for the latest updates about transit service.

Kasold Project Should Finish in March



Have patience, the work on Kasold between Bob Billings and Sixth St. is nearing completion. City engineer Dave Cronin estimates the street will be open to traffic in March. Speed limits on the street will be the same as they were before the street was reconstructed, 30 miles per hour north of Harvard 35 miles per hour south. The new street will feature 5 lanes with a center turn lane, a signalized intersection at Harvard, and a 10 foot wide multi-use path along the east side.

Update on Adoption of Centennial Park

The third cleanup of Centennial Park was held on October 20, 2018. A family of three joined Phyllis Farrar to pick up litter in the park. Thanks to all who helped with this effort.

Unfortunately, at each of the last three cleanups, no more than six people participated. This is not enough to allow us to formally adopt the park. If you believe this is still an important project, attend the annual meeting on April 16th where Centennial Park adoption will be discussed.

Traffic Safety News

At the December 4th City Commission meeting, Commissioners agreed to repeal the current Traffic Calming Policy and replace it with a Neighborhood Traffic Management Program. The old Traffic Calming Policy was used by residents to request traffic calming devices, primarily speed humps, on city streets where traffic was traveling dangerously fast. However, city staff maintained that adding speed humps might not always be the most effective way to address these problems. "The current policy promotes a rigid engineering response to neighborhood traffic concerns and inhibits the use of alternative, possibly more



effective traffic management measures," Transportation Engineer Amanda Sahin wrote in a memo to the commission.

In addition, applicants often waited years for funding to become available, only to have their project canceled because 70% of the property owners within 300 feet did not agree to the project, a program requirement.

The new program will address traffic safety problems in a more holistic manner. When traffic safety issues are identified, City staff will study the area around the location of the problem, and suggest solutions that will calm traffic without creating problems on adjacent roadways. These solutions will go far beyond built environment solutions, and will utilize application of the 5E's (Engineering, Enforcement, Education, Encouragement, and Evaluation) to neighborhood level traffic management.

One controversial aspect of this change in programs will be that all traffic calming projects currently on the waiting list for construction will be cancelled. Some city commissioners were concerned about this, and asked staff to find a way to assist existing traffic calming applicants to apply for the new program.

In a related action, city staff has posted a new page on the City of Lawrence website titled "Report Traffic Safety Concerns" that provides an opportunity for residents to report safety concerns on Lawrence streets. If you see a safety issue in the neighborhood, <u>follow this link and complete the online</u> <u>form to report the issue</u>. The more complaints the city receives about a specific problem, the more likely they are to make an effort to correct it.

Thanks to The Merc for a New Sidewalk Section on Ninth!

If you walk to the <u>Merc Co+op, your "Solar Powered, Community Owned,</u> <u>Cooperative Grocery Store"</u> at Ninth and Iowa, like many of us do, you may have noticed that the sidewalk along the south side of Ninth street has a beautiful new section. For some reason, there has always been a 50-foot gap in the sidewalk just west of the entry to the parking lot behind The Merc. The sloping grass made walking tricky and the bus stop for the route 36 bus difficult to use, especially in wet weather.

The Executive Committee of SHNA contacted Rita York Hennecke, General Manager, and asked if

anything could be done to make it easier for Sunset Hill residents to walk to the Co+op. Rita went to the management team and the Board of Directors, and all agreed that this was a problem that cried out for a solution. The got Shelter Insurance
