EC Meeting Draft Minutes – Winter, 2024

SHNA Executive Committee Meeting Monday, February 12, 2024, 6:30 pm Via Zoom

Meeting Minutes

In attendance Jon Dunham, James Jordan, David Mucci, Mariana Nieto, Chris Ostrander, Matthew Paul, Gary Webber, John White

- I. Approve <u>minutes of fall meeting</u>, Nov. 13, 2023. Minutes approved by <u>acclamation</u>.
- II. Treasurer's Report, Jordan reported \$850.79 at last meeting. Received \$40 in dues. Paid LAN dues and Joanie Stone for gift certificates. Current balance \$815.79. So far 8 renewals - \$40, \$30 dollars applause award, LAN Dues.

III. Old Business, Webber

- LAN update: Webber reported that LAN discussions for the quarter included Licensing & Inspection, Air BNB's, See-Click-Fix/New Re-Imagined, A Place For Everyone-Unhoused People, and Rep for Downtown Transit Steering Committee. Presentations included:
 - i. November: Treni Prescott presentation and discussion of code enforcement and rental licensing.
 - ii. December: Cori Wallace presentations on See-Click-Fix and "A Place for Everyone."
 - iii. January: Selected representative for Downtown Transit Location Steering Committee and discussed code enforcement and rental licensing and enforcement.
- Recruiting one additional EC member and secretary for 2024: Webber reminded participants that they should be recruiting a new EC member and recruiting a secretary. We currently have 8 members and should look for 1 more; the annual meeting might be fruitful for an additional member. The Secretary position is open.
- 3. Discuss Christ Covenant Church as venue for fall potluck: CCC is an option for our fall picnic. The Fellowship Hall will seat about 40 and can be used to serve food. We are already supporting CCC with a \$50 annual donation to use the Fellowship Hall 1-2 times per year, so no additional expenditure would be required.

- 1. 6th St. Mass St. to Iowa St.: This segment will undergo rehabilitation, including street pavement improvements. Expect some traffic impacts as crews work diligently to enhance this stretch.
- 2. 6th St. Iowa St. to Folks Rd.: Like the previous section, this area will see pavement rehabilitation. The goal is to create a more durable and reliable road surface.
- 3. 6th St. Queens Rd. Traffic Signal Installation: The installation of traffic signals at the intersection with Queens Rd. will enhance safety and streamline movement.
- 6th St. Schwarz Rd. ADA Improvements: Accessibility matters. Upgrades to sidewalks, ramps, and crosswalks will ensure that everyone, regardless of mobility, can navigate 6th Street comfortably.

5. 6th and K-10 Interchange Modernization:

(KDOT) is spearheading a significant Schwarz Rd. project at the interchange of 6th Street (U.S. Highway 40) and Kansas Highway 10. The existing interchange will transform into a diverging diamond, a design known for its safety benefits. The project aims to improve traffic flow and alleviate congestion during peak hours.

Substance Abuse and Mental Health Facilities Make Progress

Two large projects, one in Sunset Hill and one just north of 6th Street and east of Rockledge Rd. have received city approval and are moving forward. Here is a short summary of the projects.

I. A Transformative Project

Local businessmen David Hawley, co-owner of Papa Keno's pizzeria, and Aaron Thakker, owner of a Eudora-based construction company, have filed plans to convert the Super 8 motel into a drug and alcohol treatment center.

The Vision

The proposed facility aims to provide comprehensive care for individuals struggling with addiction. Here are the key features:

- 1. Extended Care: The center will offer an extended stay, typically around 28 days, during which patients will receive a range of treatments—from medical detox to counseling and therapy.
- 2. 12-Step Recovery Program: The foundation of the program will be the 12-step recovery program, known for its effectiveness in changing lives. Both Hawley and Thakker have personal connections to addiction recovery, making this project deeply meaningful to them.
- 3. Professional Administration: The facility will be professionally managed, ensuring high-quality care for patients. Other investors are also involved in the project.

Addressing a Gap

Lawrence currently lacks sufficient treatment centers for substance abuse. Many individuals seeking help end up on waitlists at facilities in Kansas City or Wichita. This new center aims to fill that gap and provide accessible, local care.

II. A Beacon of Hope for Recovery

Bert Nash Community Mental Health Center, a stalwart in Lawrence's mental health landscape, is embarking on an ambitious project. By early to mid-2025, they plan to unveil a 24-unit supportive housing complex—a beacon of hope for individuals grappling with both homelessness and behavioral health disorders.

The Vision

Bert Nash envisions a space that combines an apartment complex with an office. Located near the intersection of Sixth Street and Rockledge Road, this 43,000-square-foot facility will serve a dual purpose.

Office Space: The bottom floor will house staff members, including case managers and outreach coordinators. These dedicated professionals won't be confined to the office; they'll actively engage with tenants within the facility.

Single-Room Units: The top floor will feature 24 single-room units. These apartments are designed for individuals with low or no income who also grapple with serious mental illness. Qualifying residents will benefit from voucher-based housing subsidies.

Community Integration

Beyond bricks and mortar, Bert Nash aims to foster community integration. The complex will include a courtyard, a parking area, and room for future expansion. Plans even envision an additional building adjacent to Sixth Street, housing 12 more units of supportive housing.

The Journey Ahead

While the vision is clear, the journey requires substantial financial support. Donors, the state of Kansas, and local governments will play pivotal roles in turning this vision into reality. If all goes according to plan, residents could begin moving in as early as 2025.

Bert Nash's commitment to mental health care extends beyond clinical walls. With this housing project, they're bridging the gap between mental well-being and stable housing. Lawrence, get ready for a brighter future—one where compassion meets concrete!

Neighborhood Traffic Management Program Update

Changes have been proposed for a four-year-old program that is designed to improve traffic safety on local streets within Lawrence neighborhoods. Following a meeting in August of Neighborhood Association representatives and the Multi Modal Transportation Commission, city staff proposed changes to the program that would allow smaller projects to be considered and make selecting projects more efficient.



Here is a summary of the major proposed revisions:

- Simplified "Statement of Interest" and "Statement of Support" forms to replace the previous application form and process
- Staff support to meet with stakeholders after the statement of interest to review available data, identify concerns and define the project footprint
- An initial data collection and evaluation process to determine if the project meets the thresholds in the policy for traffic calming treatments
- Defined public engagement steps in the process that will be led by staff, including MMTC recommendation
- Established a finite timeline and number of iterations for the installation, evaluation and removal of temporary traffic calming devices
